Likewise, a Federal judge who was on the secret spying court for 3 years <u>says that it's</u> a <u>kangaroo court</u>. Even the <u>current</u> judges on the secret spying court now admit that <u>they're out of the loop and powerless to exercise real oversight</u>. When these judges raised concerns about NSA spying, the Justice Department completely <u>ignored them.</u>

In short, there is *no real oversight* by <u>Congress</u>, <u>the courts</u>, or <u>the executive branch</u> of government. And see <u>this</u> and <u>this</u>.

While leaker Edward Snowden is treated as a traitor by the fatcats and elites, he is <u>considered a hero by the American public</u>. Members of all 3 branches of government – <u>Executive</u>, <u>Legislative and Judicial</u> – have *praised* the debate on spying which Snowden's leaks started.
