It has recently been reported that forces identified as "pro-Gaddafi fighters" have been fighting back against Libya's National Transitional Council and have taken the town of Bani Walid.

Al Jazeera stated that the pro-Gaddafi forces were "well-equipped and highly trained." [1] Thus, it seems that while the US and NATO may have declared victory over Gaddafi, the people that support him are in the process of confronting the the US led military occupaiton of thier country.

While Western governments may act as if the National Transitional Council has the support of the Libyan people and is the legitimate government of Libya, they are quite incorrect. In addition to the war crimes that were committed by rebels during the US-led war against Gaddafi [2], it is now being reported that according to UN officials, "More than 8,000 pro-Gaddafi supporters are being held by militia groups, amid reports of torture."
